We had the privilege, as parents, with the boys, of meeting the Rhodesian Prime Minister, Mr. Ian Smith, whom some in the Eastern Cape will remember as a prominent rugby player for Rhodes University soon after the Second World War. He had a kind word for each and also spent some time with the staff.

Transport Arrangements

Train travel between Dale College and home is still causing concern to parents. Added to the problems of the past, misbehaviour and loss of possessions, we now have the problem of booking return facilities long before the boys even arrive home. At the end of July holidays it was difficult to secure bookings on the regular train. Many boys had to leave on earlier trains or miss the first day at school—some with rather unhappy consequences.

We have not made much headway with the South African Airways for scholar concessions on block bookings, but an ever-growing number of boys are flying to and from Dale. Special arrangements are made by the College to transport boys to the East London airport and collect them on arrival.

The association records its sincere appreciation to the College for this kind gesture.

Up to that time, Mr. John Turnbull (no relation to Dave) had attended Johannesburg meetings very conscientiously. Unfortunately for us Hylton, John's son, left Dale at the end of 1973. After that Mr. W.H.P. van der Veen and one other member attended fairly regularly, but it was decided to cut the travelling and we remained in contact with the Transvaal parents telephonically through Dave Turnbull. Thanks Dave and your committee, for the warm welcome and hospitality you have always afforded us.

At this stage we had nine boys attending Dale, with a few more prospects lined up for 1975. Enthusiasm among the parents was growing. In July 1974, Mr. Simpson visited us in Witbank. We entertained him at the Moth Club at a meeting where some 25 people were present. These included parents, prospective parents and Old Dalians. After the meeting snacks and drinks were served, and the function was enjoyed by all. Mr. Simpson also paid a visit to Mr. Kay, Headmaster of Robert Carruthers Primary School, from which all his Witbank Dalians had emanated. Congratulations to Neil Turnbull on his selection for the Border Schools' squash team which toured Rhodesia for the S.A. inter-schools squash tournament held in Salisbury last month. Thank you, Witbankers, once again for helping to raise part of the sum required to send this team away.

We see some of the Old Dalians in the area from time to time, and we thank them for their efforts in keeping Dale alive in the Platteland. To mention one, Wyndham Brown is still bowling them out on the cricket field.

A few more "thank-yous". First, to the Headmaster and staff of Dale College, who so ably look after our sons some 1100 km away from home.
